Cyberbullying Tips for Parents and Carers



CTRL+SHIFT

The teachers at TFCS are taking part in an online safety program (Ctrl Shft Global) to help students and staff stay safe online. As part of this course, we will share with students and parents some tips to stay safe online. Please see some ideas to support older students below.

The Modern Parent's Toolbox

- Teach Digital Emotional Literacy: Help your child name what they're feeling, and recognise what others might be feeling, too.
- Build an Agreement, Not a Rulebook: Collaborate on device boundaries, online tone, and what to do when things go wrong.
- Mentor, Don't Monitor: You don't need to stalk their accounts. You just need to be close enough that they come to you first.
- Know When to Escalate: If someone is at risk of harm through threats, coercion, imagesharing, or stalking contact your school and the eSafety Commissioner. If safety is in danger, call the police.

Cyberbullying is complex, networked, and often invisible to adults. But connection is still your greatest tool. Your child doesn't need a perfect parent they need a safe one.

Whether they're the victim, the instigator, or both, your calm, consistent presence is what protects them most.

At the half-way point of Term 3 the energy is really building up. The children have all now finished their **stories** and practised their typing skills on the computer! They are now ready to publish and illustrate. They have brought their characters to life with clay; we have Froggy, Cheeky the cat, the Cursed Ghost, Fox, Spider-Man and Sonic. They will be the last to get their face painted to avoid smudging.

Amongst learning about Chinese New Year and the Indian celebration of Diwali we have had book week, circus rehearsals for the show and have been making clay bell chains for the fete.

For **Chinese New Year** the kids drew some impressive dragons and we had a fortune cookie each – that, amazingly, were very insightful and matched individuals personalities. For the celebration of Diwali, we painted mandalas and ate some dhal and papadums.

Book Week was a wonderful celebration of storytelling with our character dress up, parade, and the staff performing the book "The Travel Bug". We also had an interactive incursion with Meerkat Productions. Plus, an author visit from Melaina Faranda, who told us a riveting, scary, funny, whimsical fairytale that we're still talking and thinking about days later.

Please remember it's our **excursion to Lismore next Friday** for a visit to the Archibald exhibition and the cross country run at Nesbitt Park. Kids will need to bring their lunch and water, sunscreen, and wear hats and running shoes.

Hi All,



Our writing has been going wild! We have been learning a few new tricks, and my repertoire has a new addition with writing warm-ups before our narrative writing sessions thanks to Luka who brought in a book with useful tips to teach children how to write stories. I picked out some warm-up activities straight away and they've been a useful way to get into the flow of putting thoughts to page with less second guessing. Then, an author, Melaina Faranda, visited our school during Book Week and gave a 'stream of consciousness' warm-up that fits in perfectly. Coincidence? Yes - and also, just perfect. Her visit helped make the process of not worrying too much in a first draft crystal clear.

We have moved into multiplication for maths. We are primarily focussing on the number family triangle to show inverse integers (the numbers that are multiplied by each other) and inverse division problems. The triangle makes it easy to figure out when we use it to make arrays (dot patterns that represent the sum). We are also using an easy read multiplication grid, when we choose to skip count to figure out the answers without an array. Next week we delve onto measurement in grams, kilograms, and millimetres and cm.





Ojo de Dios artworks have started and are coming along nicely. We have learned about the Huichol cultures use of them and design features. There are a few points of meaning, and we have learned they are primarily symbolic for protection of children through festivals and coming of age rituals. They have four points with an extra weaving on them to represent the four elements, air, water, fire, earth. If a child has all four points, they are 5 years old or more. They are called Tsik+Ri in the original language. This week we learn about the Bagua mirror in feng shui, and next week look at the Celtic triquetra.

Big day coming up this week with Cross Country happening in Lismore as well as visiting the Archibald the same day! That is, Friday the 29th of August.
