





We have been working at a brisk pace to make sure we have **posters** at presentation level for the final Garden Day Show & Tell of the year. We turned our research into mind maps to unpack what we learned and form our own texts. We scoured for images and put them all together with artistic titling. It has been a fun project learning about **celebrations worldwide!** 

In other **English** news, I have been getting 9 letter target puzzles to be accessible by using grapheme scrambles and phonics symbol codes to solve word spellings. Yuruugin have found the 9-letter target to be accessible with such help, and it has been fun landing on a new activity for us to do for general variety. Always some learning for me too.

In **Maths** we are moving on from data into looking at angles as a primary structural component on many shapes and revising strategies to figure out the types of algorithms we have looked at earlier in the semester.

Emmy has been holding some in depth **plant based dyeing** lessons which make me want to be a kid in our class. The results shall be something to look forward to seeing very soon.

# **Rites of Passage Adventure**



Wow! Here's a few numbers that spring to mind as I reflect on the recent Rites of Passage adventure: 14 students, 2 parents, 1 extra (awesome) young person, 1 teacher, 4 days, 3 nights, 7 hotel rooms, 20 hotel room key cards, 2 snorkelling trips, 1 giant sand dune, 1 hammerhead shark, 1 elusive dugong, 1 turtle sighting, 10+ dolphins, 100s of fish, 16 re-sun screening sessions, 1 bubbly jacuzzi, 20+ coconuts, 6 kayaks, 2 SUPs, 2 ferry journeys, 7 sneaky Slushies, 2 adorable curlew chicks, 1000s of happy memories and at least 67 hash browns from the breakfast buffet!

It was an absolute privilege to share such an amazing four days with 2025 Year 6 students, Bonnie, Coco and Rom at Tangalooma Resort, Moreton Island.

The kids were fizzing with excitement as we farewelled families at the Bowlo and piled into three cars for the journey north to Pinkenba, where we boarded the Tangalooma Flyer. Leaving behind the murky brown Brisbane River we arrived in

the azure waters off Tangalooma. The weather totally delivered the (sub)tropical paradise feel with bright warm days and balmy nights that made our frolicking all the more fun and so trouble free. Add in coconut palms (that Rom





managed get tasty coconuts from!), soft white sand and sunsets over the sea to complete the picture.

Our days were jam packed with activities thanks to Cushla's exceptional organisation. We snorkelled around the wrecks, went on a marine sightseeing boat tour, kayaked and paddle boarded, played beach volleyball, cricket and soccer, went tobogganing on sand dunes, and learnt about coastal ecosystems and marine creatures with Brylee, an engaging young EcoRanger. There was no time to cook but no worries, all our meals were catered, most buffet style and pretty tasty. The kids would probably say the pool, jacuzzi and the TVs in their rooms were also highlights!

While we were definitely living life luxuriously, there were still plenty of challenges for the kids. The intensity of so much time in a large group tested our more introverted kiddos, plunging into the deeper water while snorkeling and hurtling down the dunes also tested some nerves. Sharing the "support and supervision" role with Bonnie and Rom was a dream their unflagging patience, empathy, clear communication and humour was very much appreciated. By far the best thing about the trip was seeing the kids share such a special time together. They came closer together as a group and strengthened bonds that will hopefully withstand the transition into high school and beyond. It truly was a fitting celebration for such a wonderful group of young people.







This year's Rights of Passage adventure will certainly be remembered as an epic success made possible by the enormous fundraising and organisational efforts by parents and support from the school. Hip hip hooray!
