Alopecia Awareness Week 2025 will be held from the 17th-23rd of November.

This November, AAAF is celebrating connection, courage, and community through the AAAdventure Camp and Alopecia Areata Awareness Week.



The word "alopecia" means hair loss.

Alopecia Areata is an auto-immune disease that results in hair loss on the scalp and elsewhere on the body. It can range from small, individual smooth patches of hair loss, to total loss of all hair on the body – including ear and nose hair. Alopecia Areata is not uncommon, and current estimates suggest that 2% of the population will be affected by the condition at some point in their lifetime. It can effect people all ages, genders and ethnicity, but most commonly presents during childhood.

There is currently no cure, however AAAF is on a mission to do all we can to work towards a cure.

Alopecia Areata can be a lifelong condition, and can deeply affect self-image, self-esteem, confidence and even mental health. But there is hope. AAAF believe that through personal support, improved awareness, and ongoing research toward an acceptable treatment, we can help improve the lives of people living with Alopecia Areata and their families.

### Wow, wow, wow! What a terrific fete.

Thank you to the amazing Fete committee and all the amazing coordinators and volunteers who contributed your time and energy to showcase our incredible school!

The past few weeks have been devoted to getting ready for the big day!

They loved making **the flower hanging baskets** to decorate the school. We used this as an opportunity to practice our **sharing into groups**, counting the total of flowers and sharing them into equal groups.

The concept of sharing has also been used to **make flavoured icy poles**, sharing the different flavours equally into the icy pole cups, having tasters along the way, of course. These real-world maths experiences enrich their learning and add a greater depth of relevance to what we do.

We will continue our icy pole drive now that the weather is heating up as we aim to raise money to **adopt another koala** to our school family. Last year's Buribi raised enough money to adopt 4 koalas and a platypus as well as learning maths concepts of measuring and counting money along the way. Icy poles will be available for children to purchase each Thursday lunchtime for \$2 starting this week.



We will spend the next few weeks finishing our **insects**, **bugs and butterfly projects**. Some children have produced fascinating **information reports** about their chosen critter, learning about what they need to survive, and their super abilities. We have begun to apply this knowledge to design our **superhero costumes**, which will have special abilities like their critters.
