

Winner, Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) Book of the Year 2023, Early Childhood



The beauty of the Australian rainforest and the magic of family-time come together in this lyrical and delightful story of intergenerational connection, habitat and adventure.


MIDDLE PRIMARY Football Fever: The Kick Off, by Kristin Darell

The Buribi home visit program has been in full swing as we reach the halfway point of term 1.

We have been lucky enough to visit Eva's, Esther's, Perry's and Lucy's houses. Each visit a beautiful insight into their life at home and background. The children love the opportunity to build a connection and learn about their peers' homes.

Next week we will be visiting Freya's house at the Channon and in the coming weeks, Mabel's and Alice's houses. Aveline's house is still in Brisbane, and we will postpone her home visit until they are settled in next term.

In **literacy**, we have built on our initial sounds S, A, T, I, M to also include P, N, O. **You will find homework folders in your child's bag; please encourage learning at home.** A little bit goes a long way when it comes to learning to read and write. Please ensure they have had a nice snack and drink before embarking on extra learning so as to make it a positive experience.

In **Maths**, we are strengthening our number sense with numbers 0-20 and some extending to 0-30. We practise counting, ordering, and forward and backwards games daily and these can also be played on the journey to school.

Some examples are:

"Start at 5 and count forward?"

"Start at 10 and count backwards?"

"What number comes before 16?"

"What number comes after 12?"

The Gooarng class continue to build their **vocabulary of Bundjalung animal words** through recognising the animals that we share our environment within our acknowledgment of country every morning. They particularly like saying jugi jugi (bush turkey) and mimicking scratching in the leaves.

Lindall has been with the class on Fridays for their learning with Mitch King and writes...

"Each Friday afternoon Gooarng has the privilege of learning how to communicate ideas, emotions and stories using movement, rhythm through body percussion, and sound. Mitch King and his lovely team led the students through a series of activities that encourage a deeper understanding of culture and the connection between language and culture. Through story re-enactment the students also explore character development and the skills of performance. This complements the kids writing, where they have been recounting stories or experiences."



In **Maths** we are practising our 'friends of ten' (the pairs of numbers that add to ten). We are endeavouring to have this knowledge on quick recall so any games/practice at home would be very beneficial, such as memory game: throwing a ball, you say one number and your child catches the ball as they call out the pair that equals ten. We are moving to 'friends of 20'.

Big thanks to all parents who have reached out to me to take on **jobs for camp**. Importantly we still need someone to pull the school trailer and more hands to unpack the trailer at the end of camp.

Yuurugin Camp at 100 Tents, Kungar

This class was amazing last week at camp and it makes a teacher proud when an organiser of the group's activities praises the kids. Scott Poad from Rewild was very impressed with our students and made it very clear that it's not usual for him to take local schools on. We are one of a special few.

Activities last week included:

A high ropes activity where the kids climbed a ladder then onto a tree to a platform 8M off the ground. They then could have taken a leap of faith in an attempt to catch a static trapeze bar suspended in front of them. Every student attempted the climb and just about everyone made a jump for it, even if their every being was saying "NO!". It was fun to watch the parents have a jump and even I gave it a go.

Next was mapping and orienteering. The students learned how to use a compass, learned what contour lines were and how to set and read a bearing. They were required to work in teams and work together.





A whole day on survival 101 was a great learning experience for us all. I know that some of the kids will want to spend some of their pocket money on some of the cool water filtering devices that enable you to drink from puddles and ponds.

Students learnt how save themselves in case of a snake bite, throw a spear, and how to make fire using various methods, and

finished off with a favourite: damper on a stick.

What would a day with Scott be without a game of camouflage? Running around in the forest at its best.

So many questions asked and answered. Learning outdoors, in nature and from someone who actually lives and breathes it, is always the best fun.

Thank you so much to the parents who make these camps doable. It is without a doubt a massive task to take kids away and have as much fun as you can in the bush next to a creek, without all of the adult support.

Thank you so much to all of the teachers who take our children away on these camps. It's a long and tiring few days, even with the parents, and it is with my deepest gratitude I say thanks.

Guruman (Years 5&6)

In the world of **Numeracy**, Guruman have taken a big step in the last two weeks, with the beginning of their Long Division journey, one of the major landmarks in number manipulation. It's impressive that many have picked up the skill very quickly and it's also very impressive that many haven't, but are persisting in facing the challenge. It may well be a skill that is under-utilised in many people's later life, but it is such an excellent brain gym, with a wide array of skills needing to be brought together.

Also in **Numeracy**, we have looked at the application of Maths to the use of money: how to make any amount of money with a variety of note denominations. This is useful of course in future use of cash, but even more useful when travelling the world, dealing with a variety of currencies and amounts.

In **Literacy** we have broken the codes of suffixes with Word Crackers, investigating the patterns of spelling in the various vowel/consonant combinations, learning when to Add, Double, Drop or Change for each word and suffix.

We have also expanded our analysis of **Fairy Tales**, examining them from unusual perspectives like that of the witch, the giant, the wolf or the step-mother. I have been very impressed by the level of maturity, empathy and insight demonstrated by Guruman in classroom discussions about identifying the hero or the villain in situations.

On a **Grammarly** note, me and Guruman worked out why it should be Guruman and I, except just then that should have been Guruman and me; subject-verb-object structure and its effect on pronouns. This then led to some wonderful Silly Sentences in our random dictionary games.

We have also had some excellent highly engaging sessions with **Mitch King on Friday's** doing a variety of Drama games.



This week of course we are off on our big Brisbane adventure. Many tales to tell on our return.

Leaps and Bounds, Joe



 Guruman had great fun pulling apart laptops and repurposing the parts into jewellery or robot figures; continuing to explore mechanical computers with the Turing Tumble, and are starting to research the impacts of our computerised world. With Akash they have cooked up delicious dahl and flatbread.



- Yuruugin honed their investigation skills by testing the strength, flexibility and flammability of a range of plastic items, as well as getting serious about the affects of plastic pollution in our soil, water and atmosphere. With Akash they have helped wrangle the weeds in their garden bed and pop in some seedlings.
- Gooarng shared their ideas about how the Earth and humans have come into existence, learned about
 different cultural and scientific theories about creation and evolution and have begun to explore how
 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people used natural resources to live sustainably. With Akash they have
 been busy in the garden helping to get it back to a productive patch.
- **Burubi** were thrilled to see their "baby" seedlings had sprouted and to mark out their plots in the garden. With Akash they helped to harvest cucumbers and make dough.

All going well we will have a film crew affiliated with the Stephanie Alexander program with us on Wednesday 6th March to capture some footage of our kitchen/garden classes in action.
