Hello families, It's exciting to be starting Term 2 with the students ready and raring to go!

This term, our shared theme is *Insects*. As well as being the theme for our class learning, Insects will run through our investigation learning, STEAM, SEE and Fionn's teaching day on Fridays. Our investigations of insects will be threaded through creative arts, literacy and numeracy learning where towards the end of term, we will make an information poster that identifies the distinguishing characteristics of an insect, identify the three main sections of an insect, their habitat and what they eat. If families have any insect themed books, samples, or knowledge, feel free to share them with us throughout the term.



We will also start to practice our **Winter Solstice songs** for our end of term celebration. They are catchy tunes; you might find yourself singing along! Towards the end of term, we will begin to **make our lanterns** for the celebration. We may need some **recycled supplies** for the lantern making, we will keep you posted. Any concerns or queries, please contact Ishta or Heather via the school phone, or via email.

We are settling back into full swing wonderfully.

We are writing **information reports** this term. **'Micro-worlds Explored'** is the theme. We will be making **Kombucha** in the class, learning about the micro-organisms involved in the fermentation and learning how to structure our own information reports. So far, we have been writing information reports of our choice to see where we are at and starting Week 2 shall see the commencement of Kombucha making. The look into micro-organisms ties well into Emmy's unit on soil health.

The **main sound** for the next two weeks is '**or**'. Every new spelling has a short story that our students read, then they answer 10 simple questions to help them integrate the specific spelling.

In **maths**, for weeks 2 and 3, we are looking at **place value** up to 4-digit numbers for the year 3 students, and 5 digits for the year 4s. We will also be going into strategies to handle different multiplication and division problems.



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Lastly, *this term's camp at Fingal Head in Week 4, 17 - 19 May.* This is a heads up for any arrangements and logistics that need attending, such as trailer duties, time off work, who is driving whom, etc. We will be combining the camp with the Guruman class.

The biggest thing happening for Guruman and Yuruugin this term is the **three-day camp at Fingal Head**, May 17-19. We are still looking **for drivers to take the camp trailer**, so please let me know if you are able to do so. At the camp, we will also need people to run the **kitchen**.

Making History is our focus this term, as an integrated **English/History** unit, examining the structure of nonfiction books, in particular Bruce Pascoe's Young Dark Emu. Students will collect historical artefacts and discuss their importance and relevance to our life. This unit will also be integrated with Emmy's STEM focus where students will build structures described within the Dark Emu text. We have some great new resources for looking at Australian history from indigenous perspectives.

Measurement in the kitchen will be our focus for **Maths**, which will also involve application of the scientific method to get the recipe right. Lots of taste testing involved. As well as working with multiple units of measurement, students will also master the power of division as an operation.

Soccer is our sport focus, with the goals all fixed and ready for play. In **Music**, we are looking at multipart music performances and hopefully performing new pieces at the Winter Solstice celebrations. In **Art**, we are experimenting with colour gradient with a variety of mediums and learning a variety of sketching techniques. In **Drama**, we have already started on **a new play**, the recording of which will be available soon on the school website.

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It's looking like a very busy and fun term. Joe.

Science S.E.E - Emmy Jett

This unit has students delving deep into the life cycles, senses, needs and roles of bugs (arthropods, crustaceans, annelids and molluscs). Key questions include: what are bugs? Where do they live? What are their ecological roles? How do humans interact with bugs? They will investigate bugs as pollinators, decomposers, food, pests and soil aerators. Students will conduct bug surveys, research bug biology, create models of lifecycles and bugs and build bug habitat.

Literacy

- Information report writing students will create informative posters about an insect of their choice, and present to the class.
- In regular daily sessions the students will continue to grow their language skills through word work, guided reading, and targeted grammar and writing sessions.
